Dear friends,

The month of March finds us in the second half of the season of Lent. As Fr. Christopher suggested in his sermon on the first Sunday of Lent, perhaps we have gone with Jesus into the desert. Perhaps, like Jesus, we are saying “no” to temptations and distractions that cushion us from feeling our life as it really is, and we are experiencing evenings or days off with nothing to do, or a lonely or tired feeling without taking our habitual escape route from it.

When I do this, I see that while my life in these desert times is not always fun or satisfying or comfortable, it is more real. It’s like I hit a sort of matter-of-fact clarity, a sober bottom where I plunk down on the ground and accept my experience, whatever it is. Laying aside my self-distractions, I actually find that it is a relief to land in this place of reality. God is there, and it is enough.

As March comes to a close, we enter the paschal mystery of Jesus’ suffering, death, and resurrection. With Jesus, we enter our own paschal mystery, too. Washing one another’s feet on Maundy Thursday, we feel our *own* tenderness towards all humanity, the same humanity for whom Jesus died. Spending an hour in vigil in the church that night when Jesus was betrayed in Gethsemane, we wait with fear and trust in our *own* times of unknowing. Walking in pilgrimage to Chimayo or hearing the story of the crucifixion in the church on Good Friday, we recall *our* sacrifices and our suffering that we offer to God. And celebrating the color, music, light, and joy on the morning of Jesus’ resurrection, we allow ourselves to feel that in God, for *us*, too, everything is made new.

Lent and the paschal mystery take us, if we are open to it, into the depths of our own experience and into the depths of grace. We hit bottom and find we are grounded; we love, wait, suffer, and we are made new. None of this is something that we need to accomplish by our own spiritual skill. It happens by the grace of God when we *invite* it to happen.

Parking Challenges and Options

With the construction of our Ministry Complex, we have temporarily lost our west parking lot. We hope that you are finding adequate parking in the following locations:

- our east lot adjacent to the parish hall (handicap spaces are there)
- the far east lot, recently expanded by some 35 new spaces
- at Stucco Seal, two blocks west of the church

Members who can easily walk some distance are asked to park as far away as possible, leaving the close-in spaces for the elderly, the handicapped, and visitors.

Holy Week and Easter at St. Michael's



Palm Sunday, March 28

At all services, the liturgy will focus on the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem as the Messiah. We begin with a festive procession outside, waving palm branches and singing his praises.

Tenebrae, Tuesday March 30, 7pm

This service is a dramatic blend of the themes and moods of Holy Week, with special music and readings from various sources, including scripture.

Maundy Thursday, April 1

9:30 Eucharist – focus on the Last Supper

6pm Eucharist and Footwashing – we hear readings about Jesus' call for us to be servants, as he was; we wash one another's feet, strip the altar, and begin an *all-night watch* with Jesus in the church, remembering his time in the Garden of Gethsemene.

Good Friday, April 2

12-3 Liturgy – readings from the Passion Narrative, homilies, lengthy contemplative silences, Stations of the Cross, and chant fill this time that Jesus was on the cross.

Parish Pilgrimage to Chimayo – walk the Way of the Cross with other parishioners and thousands of pilgrims to the historic, healing church in Northern New Mexico. Information to follow.

7pm Liturgy – the Passion Narrative, sermon, and music from our 11:15 Sunday choir.



Holy Saturday, April 3, 9am

A very short service of waiting by the tomb, hoping for new life. Followed by decorating and preparing our sacred space for Easter services. Help needed!

Easter Sunday, April 4

6am The Great Vigil – an outdoor fire in the early morning darkness, with the light slowly increasing as readings of God's renewing Spirit are shared, the Resurrection is triumphantly proclaimed, Holy Baptism, and a breakfast following.

9am Eucharist – with our usual 9am Sunday music, a festive liturgy of Resurrection.

11:15 Eucharist – with our 11:15 choir and instrumental ensemble, featuring portions of Bach's *Easter Oratorio*

All Angels Day School

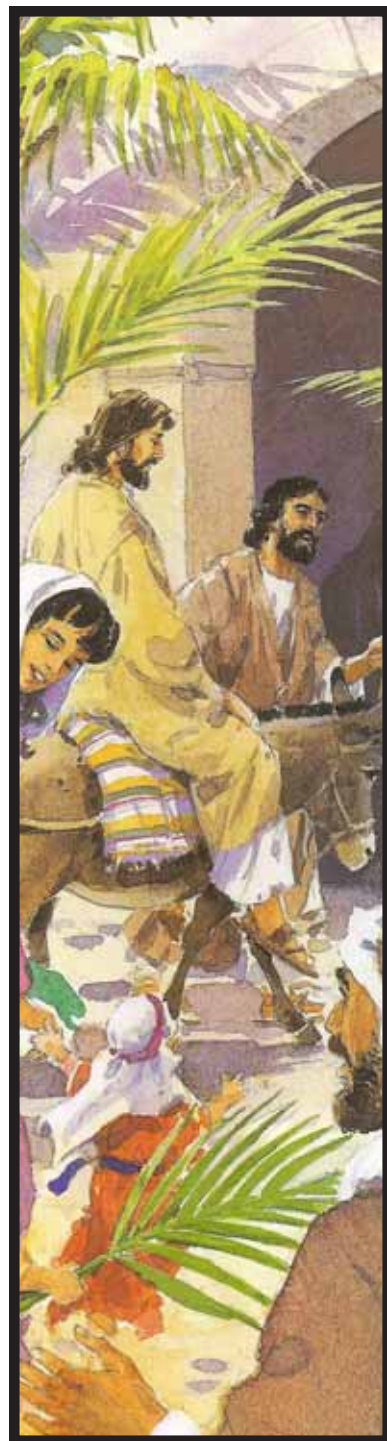

St. Michael's Purchases Conrad Stack Property Next Door

We are very grateful to the handful of parishioners who contributed \$117,000 for the purchase of the small parcel of land adjacent to our east parking lot, formerly owned by the late Conrad Stack.

Because of the depressed real estate market, we were able to purchase the property for significantly less than the amount raised. One of our donors graciously gave us permission to use a small portion of their gift to expand parking in our far East lot (see above). The remainder of the donations will be used to improve the Stack property.

What will we do with this property? A committee of people skilled in property evaluation and parish needs will be looking at our options, which range from tearing the structures down, to storage, outreach, parking, a green zone, and other ideas. What we do know is that we need the space, and this previously-missing link in our property now completes the campus and allows for more flexibility in how we use it. ☺

Financial Report

The Financial news for period ending January 2010 is reported below. In January we realized a net surplus totaling \$47,667, primarily due to approximately \$37,000 of 2010 pledges paid in 2009 posted to January 2010 income. Even considering this, pledge income was much higher this month than in the past three years. We hope this pattern of giving will continue.

Most of our parishioners have made their 2010 pledges and we are so grateful. However, if you have not yet turned in your 2010 pledge, please do so at your earliest convenience.

You will also notice under the New Building Project, a significant reduction in the fund balance at the end of January. This is due to paying off our Mortgage at 719 Montano and the closing costs for our New Ministry Complex construction loan.

During this Holy season, and as we await the arrival of spring, we again give thanks for your continued generosity and support of our faith community.

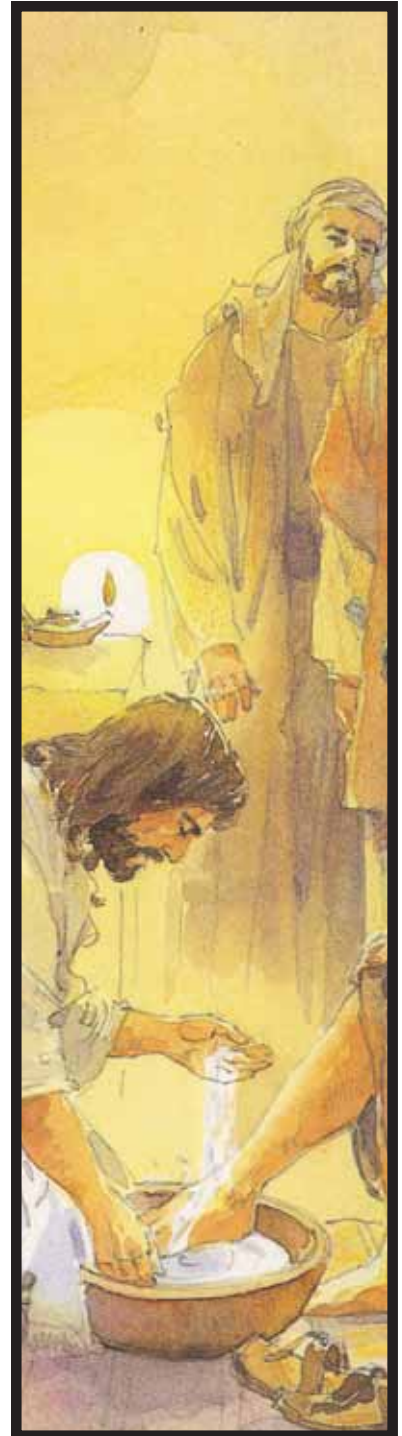

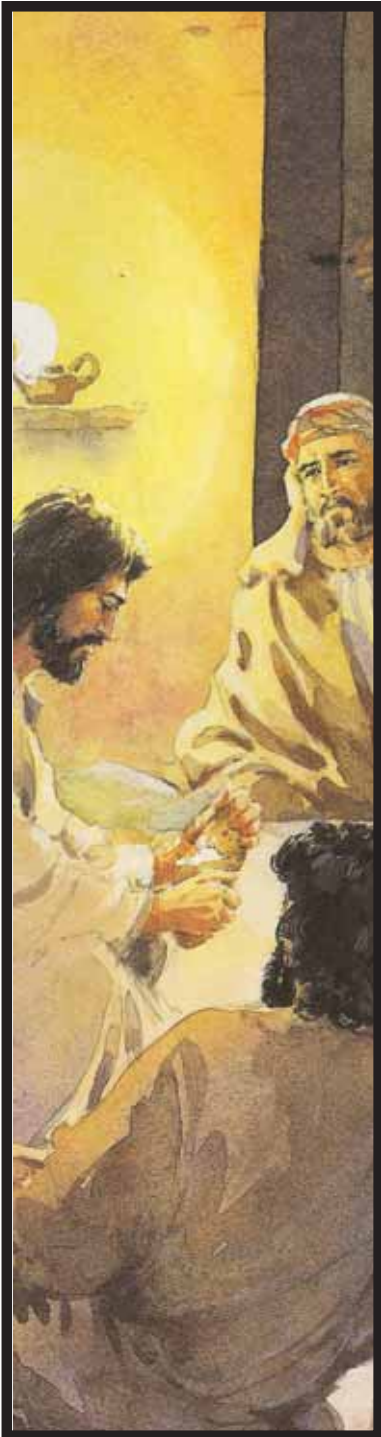
New Books in Library March 2010

Theological Premises of Episcopal Work on Behalf of Immigrants and Refugees

No leap of theology is required to place ministry to displaced, uprooted persons in a fundamental relationship to our Christian calling. As we are initiated into our faith through baptism, we are reminded in the covenant made at baptism that we must “seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving our neighbor as ourself” and “strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being”. The Baptismal covenant is a call to reach out to those who are a part of a suffering community. Commencing with the Old Testament, God reminds the people of Israel in Leviticus to extend themselves to strangers since they too experienced alienation as inhabitants of another land. To be linked to our immigrant origins and to affirm our nation as one having a vibrant immigrant tradition is to recall our roots as a basis for identifying with those who are repeating, although often under more traumatic circumstances, the journey of earlier sojourners. Unfortunately, our recollection must also include those periods in our history where nativism and parochialism painfully thwarted the aspirations of newcomers to find a comfortable welcome in their adopted homeland.

(...) Probably no Gospel story so clearly underscores the hospitality expected of us as that of the Good Samaritan. On so many levels, the account of the Samaritan offering comfort and support to the wounded traveler underscores the Gospel imperative of hospitality. This parable reminds us that neighbors are often unlike us and may come from communities and regions that have been shunned or treated with disdain. Yet, we are told to embrace an inclusive view of family and community in expressing our faith. In



the parable, the provision of hospitality is more than a gesture - it is a willingness to see the hurt friend through to recovery, to make a difference in restoring hope to the suffering. We are admonished to create the time and space to extend help. The story of the Good Samaritan calls us to invest ourselves in the restoration and recovery of others regardless of circumstance. It is also a message against the racism and prejudice that can affect our attitude toward refugees and immigrants. ☞

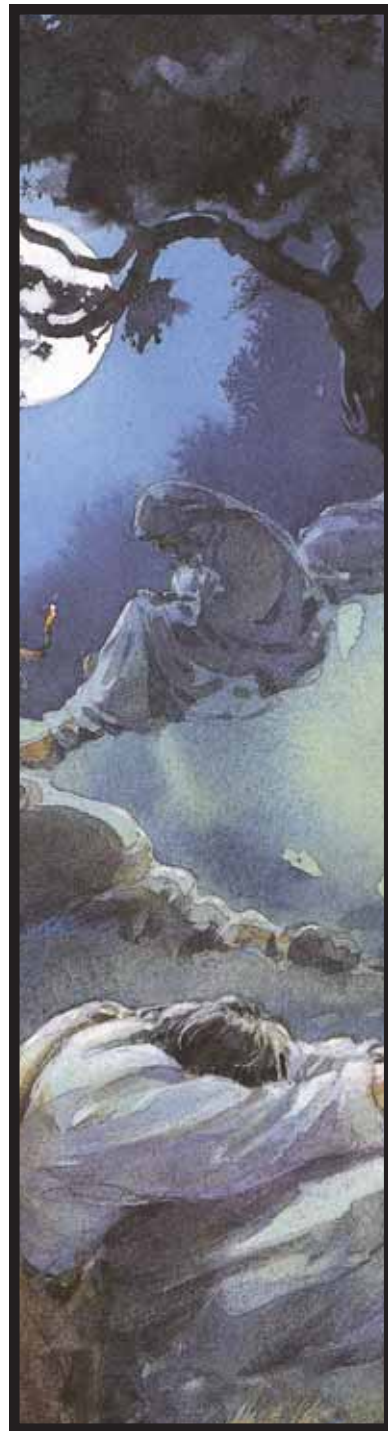

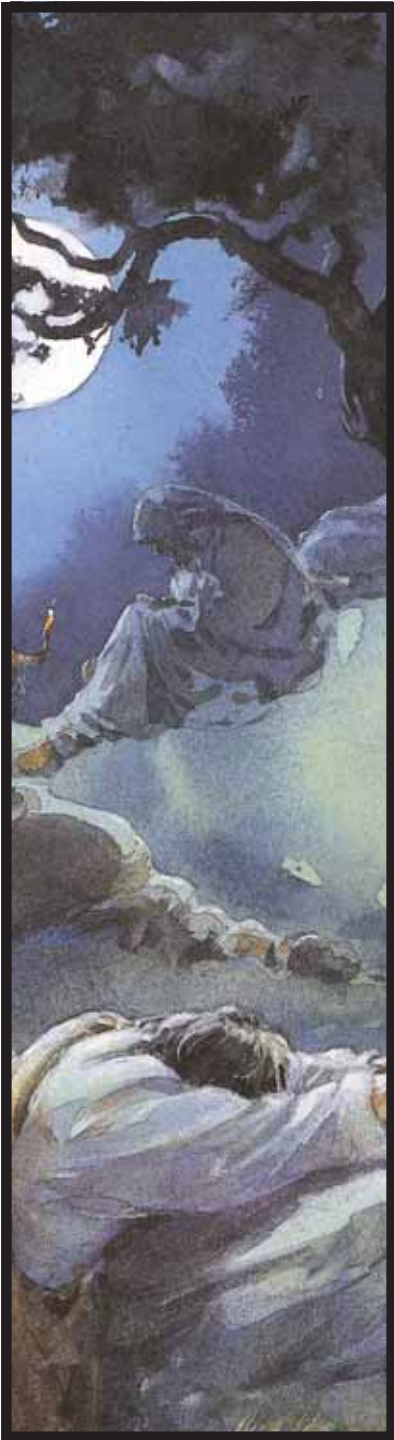

Diocesan Standing Committee Withholds Consent on L.A. Bishop,

Allows Bishop Gene Robinson to Visit St. Michael's June 27

In December, our Vestry and clergy sent a letter to the Standing Committee urging their consent to the election of Mary Glasspool and Diane Bruce as assisting bishops in the diocese of Los Angeles. Glasspool happens to be a lesbian, and has been in a committed relationship with someone for 19 years. In January, our Standing Committee voted to give consent to Bruce, but not to Glasspool. No explanation has yet been given for their vote.

In order for elections to be complete, consents from a majority of bishops and Standing Committees throughout the church are required by early March. The results of this will be posted in the April issue of *the Angelus*.

Our Standing Committee also decided to allow Bishop Gene Robinson, a partnered gay man and bishop of the Diocese of New Hampshire, to preach and celebrate at St. Michael's on Sunday June 27. Bishop Robinson will be in town that weekend for Santa Fe Gay Pride festivities and an Equality New Mexico event in Albuquerque. Bishop Robinson will preach and celebrate at least for the morning

services on June 27, and there will be an opportunity for dialogue with the congregation that morning as well.

We are grateful to the Standing Committee for this decision, and hope that it signals a new era of openness, acceptance, and healing in our diocese. 🌀

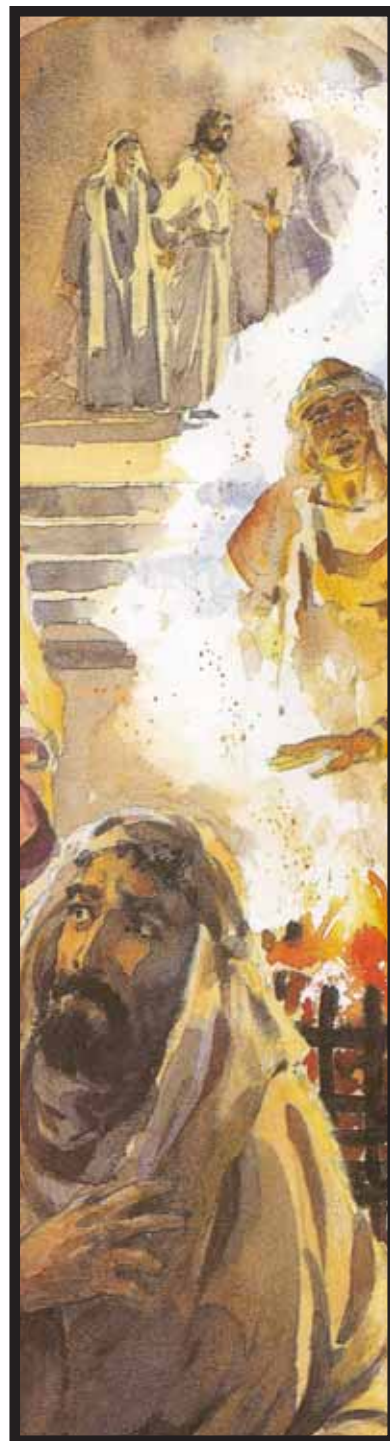

Design Committee Report

The Work has begun!!

Over the next 6 months you will see a most amazing transformation of what faith and community can do. Britton Construction has already begun demolition and earth work. Around the beginning of March the foundations and mechanical rough ins will begin. In April we should be able to see the framing start. In May we will see the roof installed and the interior work begins. In June and July we should see the finishing touches as the project comes to completion, and start anticipating our exciting move in process.

Parking will be an issue during this process. You will be hearing more about parking options with the stucco company a few properties to the west and we will soon remodel our east parking lot for greater capacity. The purchase of 525 Montano, (the Conrad Stack property) will allow for more flexibility and better flow from our east lot.

Some ministries will be more affected than others. The altar guild sacristy and vesting sacristy are part of the remodel so those involved will be moving to temporary areas, most likely the church office, for some of the months of construction. The food pantry has lost valuable



parking spaces used by the many that come for food and care. Britton has been working with the food pantry each Tuesday to make this as smooth as possible.

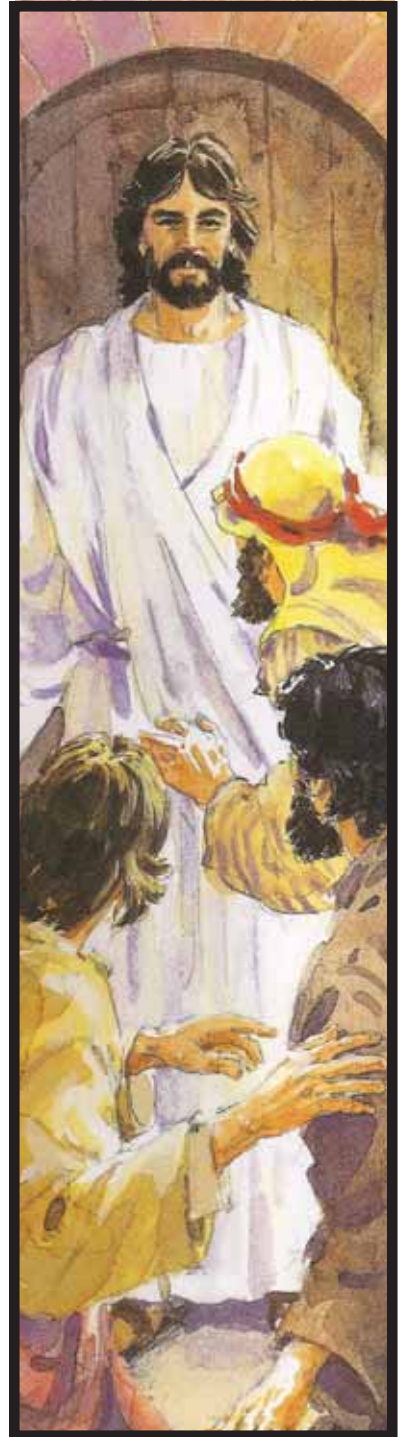
